These excursions and activities truly complement the learning that happens in the classroom on a daily basis. I congratulate the following groups of students along with the teaching and support staff.

- Students from Years 8, 9 and 10 who attended the 2019 Avalon Air Show with gusto to learn about the integration of STEM.
- The Year 10s who headed to the Melbourne Museum to investigate Rights and Freedoms through the Nelson Mandela Exhibition.
- Our Year 5 and 6 Summer Sport students.
- Our Year 9 and 10 Volleyball students.

I congratulate them all for the way they managed in the heat, quietly sitting in the shade, chatting and relaxing during breaks or simply maintaining hydration and being sun smart when outside the college. This week our students have been out and about enjoying the sunshine during breaks and undertaking sporting activities. We now look forward to the last 4 weeks of the term as the days become shorter and cooler.

This week members of the Principal Class are attending the Hobson's Bay Network Principal Conference. Mr McGee, Mrs Elmer and Mrs Giles have maintained the smooth running of the school during our absence and I thank them for their efforts. Our focus has been student voice, choice and agency. Our discussions have been driven by research using the conversations we have had with our students over the past fortnight. We have so much to learn if we truly listen to our students as we move forward as a Prep to Year 12 College. Mr Guthridge has also provided information in this newsletter on the PIVOT surveys our students have undertaken to enable them to provide feedback to their teachers.

Last week our primary staff participated in a full day professional learning activity with a specific focus on reading. Classes were supported by leading teachers, principal class and relief staff. You may have noticed that your child's regular teacher was not in the classroom. The day was facilitated by an external provider with teachers unpacking the Fountas and Pinnell assessment program to ensure we complete a deep analysis of student comprehension. Our focus in the primary years is on students delving deeper into their reading using the skills of interpretation, analysis, synthesis and evaluation. At Altona College we are all learners and we commit to the best possible learning for our staff within our PLC's. Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) are an approach to school improvement where groups of teachers work collaboratively at the school level to improve student outcomes using data and research based practices. We truly are focusing on the right work here at the college.

Please take the time to regularly remind your child/ren about safety, especially when going to and from school. This week one of our primary students took control of an uncomfortable situation by immediately reporting the issue. We advise that, wherever possible, children should travel to or from school with their friends, rather than travel alone.

Monday is a public holiday and students do not attend school. Labour Day is an annual public holiday that celebrates the eight-hour working day, a victory for workers in the mid-late 19th century. The argument for the eight-hour day was based on the need for each person to have eight hours labour, eight hours recreation and eight hours rest. I hope all families enjoy the extra time out this weekend.

There are many extracurricular activities coming up in the next few weeks. These are listed on the COMPASS calendar. It will no doubt be a very busy end to the school term.

# Assistant Principal Reports

Dear families,

Our primary teachers are working hard to ensure that the teaching occurring in classrooms is targeted to the needs of the students. Some recent assessments have enabled us to outline some specific areas that we can focus our attention. We have an unwavering approach to improving the learning growth in the area of reading. Whilst the teaching is targeted in the classroom, we really encourage support from families, and ask that they take a real interest in their child's home reading.

Some simple things you can do as a parent or guardian are:

- Set the routine for child's home reading and stick to it.
- If your child is a very early reader, focus on the initial letters and sounds of simple words.
- Ask "what else starts with A" - apple, ant etc.
- Ask "what rhymes with cat?" - mat, flat etc..
- Encourage them to point the words with their own finger, to pace their reading accordingly.
- Ask your child to predict what the story might be about by looking at the front cover.
- If they've read the book before, ask them to tell you the story using their own words first.
- Discuss the illustrations, the facial expressions of characters and any interesting punctuation such as quotation marks, commas and full-stops.
- Ask lots of open questions about facets of the text. These require the child to think more deeply about the plot, the characters or the authors intention or perspective.

Give some of these hints and tips a try and be sure to sign off on your child's home reading diary. You will find that your child really enjoys telling you all about their text/texts and the benefits are very rewarding.

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Another exciting fortnight has flown by! I was privileged to join the year 7 cohort on their camp to Billabong Ranch last week and enjoyed getting to know more of our students. Although short, a great deal was achieved during the 3 day program. Minigolf, trampolines, horse riding, orienteering, commando courses and bush first aid were all great to watch. Although the extreme heat made conditions challenging, I was pleased with the resilience our students showed as they persevered and embraced each opportunity. Perhaps more pleasing was the comradery that developed amongst the cohort, with new friendships forming and existing bonds strengthening.

I am also pleased to report that we have seen a dramatic improvement in the yard which I hope will continue. We will remain vigilant as a staff and continue to monitor the environment, however the College appears to be much calmer at present. I was also very appreciative of the amount of parents who spoke out in support of our decision to openly communicate and act upon our concerns around behaviour in the early stages of the year. Working together, we have had a number of very positive conversations with students and families in efforts to better understand the unique learning, social and emotional needs of each individual. Our teachers will continue to make various modifications to personalise learning and we are now seeing an even higher work output from many students. I hope this can continue and look forward to seeing the great results that come from open, honest, supportive conversation between parents, teachers and students.

In line with our emphasis on meaningful conversation about learning, we are also excited to launch our Pivot Professional Learning program next week. This will give students the opportunity to evaluate their teachers performance in specific classes, across a range of criteria. Students will remain anonymous within their class and teachers will receive immediate feedback about what they are doing well and what students would like to see change in their teaching. We will then commit to ongoing, professional reflection and learning within our teaching teams. Ultimately, this means that the learning and research that our teachers undertake, will be directly informed by what the students tell us they experience in the classrooms – not what we think, but what they think. We are all a community of learners and if we are going to strive for continuous growth from our students, we as teachers and parents must also model our ability to continuously reflect, learn and improve ourselves. We will continue this focus on providing students with opportunities to inform the way our school grows and changes and I personally can't wait to see what we can learn from them.

I hope everyone has a great long weekend and takes the chance to recharge before we push ahead to Easter.

The program has taken an innovative approach to ensure all First Aid lessons are a fun and interactive experience for students of all learning capabilities. Our junior students learned about how to identify when there is an emergency, keeping themselves safe, and how to call for an ambulance.

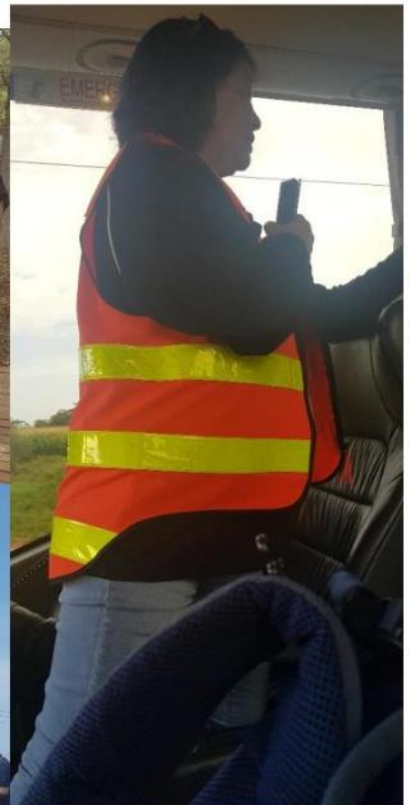
You can use a spiralizer with other vegetables such as carrots, winter squash, beetroot, and sweet potato!

### **Can \$500 help with school expenses?**

Back to school can be an expensive time for many families. The Smith Family and ANZ run a program called Saver Plus, a program that teaches people good savings and money management tools. Eligible families save \$50 / month over ten months and attend a short money management workshop in the local area. At the end of the program, ANZ provides \$500 funding for school and extracurricular expenses. The program has been running for 16 years and has many fantastic outcomes, including helping and encouraging parents to talk to their children about money from a young age – as early as preschool and primary school, right through the high school years. When parents role model good money behaviours and have open conversations about the household budget, this helps children be better equipped to manage their money as they grow, and [can help establish good money habits for life](#).

To be eligible, you must have children at school or studying yourself, have regular income (either your or your partner) and have a current Health Care card or concession card.

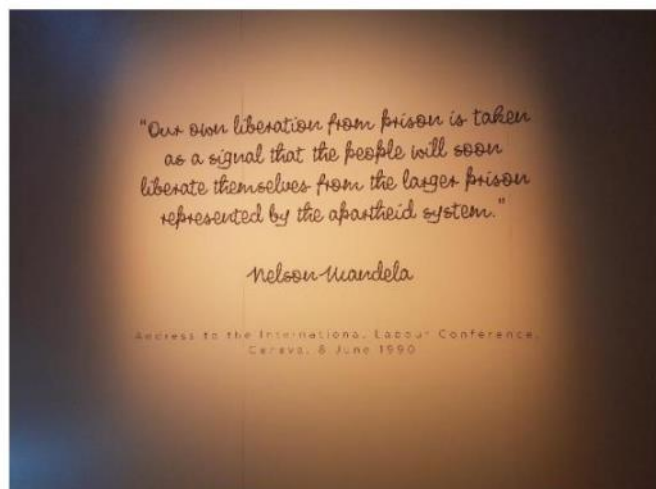
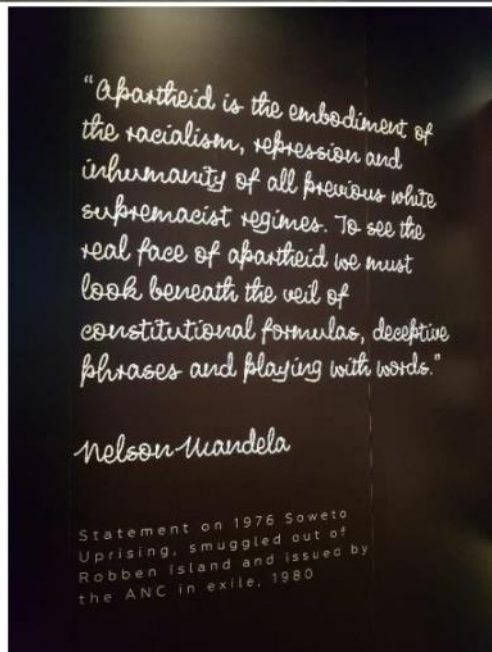
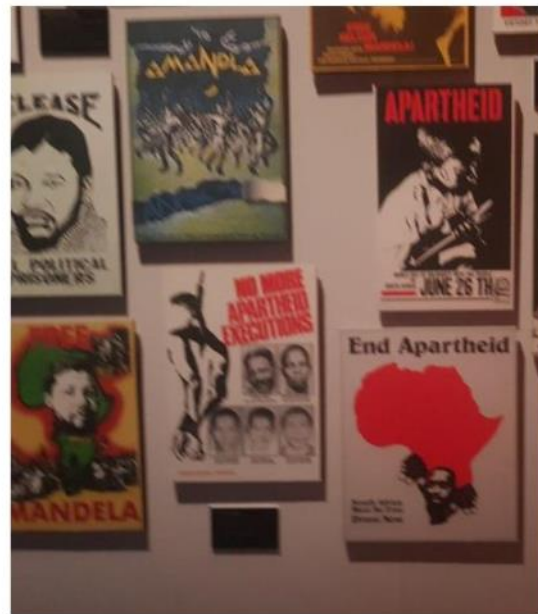
# YEAR 10 RIGHTS AND FREEDOMS

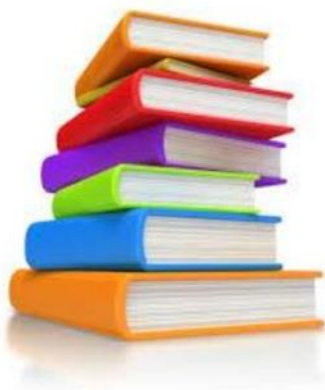
