Dear families

Our 2020 Year 7 information evening was held last evening. We had strong support from our current families and the local community. We filled the open space in the middle year's community and eventually ran out of chairs, it was standing room only. 2020, Year 7 enrolment requests will be circulated by primary schools on the 23rd April. Offers will be sent out in August. It was a memorable evening and the largest show of support we have experienced from families within the local Altona area. This is your local secondary school and we look forward to working with our community to ensure it stands as a school of choice in Altona.

We have worked tirelessly over the past 8 months to begin the journey into the later years with year 10 underway and we are well on track for 2020. We have modified buildings for learning spaces, commenced the installation of an Apple lab VISCOM studio, signed off on improvements to the gym which will provide another learning space on the mezzanine and reduce noise. We have \$4.7m promised in the May budget. We will then formalise a master plan for the P – 12 facility and begin addressing additional facilities to meet our community vision. We have been visiting many other senior education providers. We have already linked into the VET cluster to ensure alternative pathways for our students.

May I take this opportunity to thank the staff who set up interactive displays, spoke to parents and students and shared their passion for our growing secondary school. They show continued professionalism, excellence and dedication. It is their motivation in the classroom that will help to create a college that is bright with embraced opportunities.

ELEVATE – High Achievers Program year 7 2020



Next year we will be launching our new ELEVATE program in Year 7 enabling students to access a high achievers program in their local neighbourhood. In this program, students will have access to fewer teachers, for longer periods of time. Our experienced and innovative staff will support students to engage in deep, complex learning experiences across multiple aspects of the Victorian Curriculum. Immersed in studies of deep learning, Elevate students will be challenged to use deep and logical thinking to solve problems focused on key global issues and contexts. Elevate students will play an active role in developing their capacity to learn, consistently obtaining and evaluating evidence of their learning growth. In conjunction with their teachers, students will shape future learning tasks and seek and accept feedback offered by their peers and teachers.

The unique structure of our Elevate program provides accelerated pathways for students as they seek continued success in future education and training endeavours. The integration of Elevate units enables students to develop creativity and to find innovative solutions to problems. The Elevate students will be proficient users of technology as they capture, create and communicate their knowledge and ideas to others. Active and informed, our Elevate students seek to have a positive impact on their peers and local and global community.

Assistant Principal Reports

Year 7 Information Evening

Wow! I don't have another expression to describe our Year 7, 2020 information evening. Over 180 people attended with keen interest, well over 75% of them from our local Altona College, Altona Primary and Seaholme Primary Schools. Things are looking very promising for the continued growth of Altona College. People are certainly starting to notice the tireless work that is being done to continuously improve our school. I was so pleased to see so many of our own families attending the evening to learn more about how our team will continue their child's learning journey.

A special mention must be made for the students and staff who stayed back late to ensure we had a showcase available to our visitors. I sincerely thank everyone who helped pull the night together and even cater for the huge influx of people that made last minute registrations. It seems that next year we will be looking for a larger venue to host in! Over the coming weeks, secondary school preferences will be required and we will provide the appropriate paperwork as it becomes available.

Year 8-10 camps

On Tuesday evening our school council discussed some new camps to be added to the calendar this year. Although there are a few minor details to finalise, I can confirm information to assist families in preparing for these exciting opportunities.

Year 8 camp: The Summit camp will run in late November for Year 8. This will be an adventure based camp with a heavy emphasis on the challenge by choice philosophy. Cost will be kept below \$380 all inclusive.

Snow camp: Running mid-September for years 9 & 10, a limit of 40 places are available for a 2 day, 2 night downhill ski or snowboard experience. As many of you would be aware, a family trip to the snow can cost more than a full family holiday so we are working hard to make the experience accessible. Students will get a 2 day lift pass to Mt. Buller, resort entry, a 2 hour lesson each day, equipment and clothing hire as well as meals and 2 nights accommodation. This experience will be kept below \$600.

Mittagundi: Although this is not a school camp as such, this experience will be available to year 9-10 students in groups of no more than 3 students at a time. This is a 10 day experience including 4 days of hiking through the Victorian high country as well as an extended stay in a pioneer style farm. No power, bake your bread for toast in the morning, milk the cow for milk on your cereal! This is an incredible opportunity for students who are resilient enough to step way out of their comfort zone for a real adventure. Priced at around \$450, this is a unique experience for a limited number of students.

Remember that CSEF is available for eligible families. Further information will be provided early in term 2.

Dear families,

Another very busy fortnight for our college. We welcomed two new students into our primary classes and true to form, our students stepped up to support them immediately. That is what we have come to expect, and it makes us extremely proud when we see it happen without teacher involvement. Congratulations to those involved, what a great way to demonstrate our school values all in one.

Throughout term 1, one of our challenges have been to tone down the level of physicality in student play. As you will be aware, rough play can lead to injury and even escalate into something more serious. We continue to remind our students that 'hands off' is the rule. It is a work in progress of course. We are so fortunate to have amazing open play spaces so please speak with your child about how to ensure this occurs safely.

I'd like to take this opportunity to remind parents about the importance of our students wearing correct school uniform. We have noticed an increase in multi coloured socks and bright head wear being worn. We are very strict on our secondary students on their uniform and we need to develop good habits early on, particularly as the college is growing. Please ensure your child is wearing standard uniform items only.

Just like the students, our teachers have been learning. As a team, the Year 3-6 teachers have been working on developing guided reading practices that explicitly target the needs of our students. On Wednesday, Mr Trambulo conducted a small group guided reading lesson that was planned by the team, and observed by his colleagues. They will provide feedback on its effectiveness through the eyes of the student and the lesson will be improved as result. Just an example of how we aim for continual improvement.

A gentle reminder to families to ensure that your child gets to read with you at home. Their reading diary needs to be signed by a parent/guardian in order for it to contribute towards the Star Reader program.

Practice must be done every day at home. If you can't practice at home, sign up for a practice room at school.

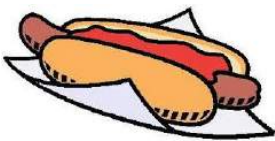
